LAST MEETING: Lee Neale gave us all an interesting insight in what to look out for when your plants are near to death. She called her list the 'camel list', referring to the factor that 'breaks the camel's back' (ie 'the last straw'). In other words if your plant is under stress then it may only take one more small thing that is enough to tip the balance. This may be insect attack, too much or lack of water, heat or cold and many other points Lee touched on. Probably something I need to take on board is Lee's culling of weak or disease prone plants as she pointed out these will only continue to be a problem in your collection.

A nice selection of Cattleya seedlings was available for sale from Leroy Orchids. (Mostly their own breeding). Results of the AGM are published below.

EDITOR'S COMMENT

CULTURE

With the change in temperature expected the first thing I did was to remove one layer of shading off my orchid houses to let in more light and allow them to heat up some more. I also closed down the ends where the cold southerly draft can cool things down very quickly. These are small changes which can make a big difference. Fans have been turned down as I don't want evaporative cooling more than is necessary. Those of you who attended the BBQ will have noticed how Maarten's Cattleyas have responded to some heat. They certainly grow a lot quicker and bigger than mine and most other growers I know. But don't be lulled into thinking all your orchids need heat. I have had a busy summer keeping the Masdevallias cool and the Oncidiinae moist. Some genera just don't like it hot. I will definitely be cutting back on the water a lot more this winter after seeing where many of the orchids were growing in Thailand.

PRESIDENTS REPORT 2013

We have again had another very successful year with membership numbers staying approx the same as last year. We seem to pick up new members at about the same rate as we lose those that resign or don't come back to the club.

Financially we are still doing extremely well even though we have been generous with our outgoings especially those that go directly back to members.

Attendance at club days has been very good which is what we like to see although sourcing speakers is a continuing problem. On a favourable note, we are seeing a gradual increase in plants benched by newer members while others are continuing to support us with plants.

Undoubtedly our biggest event last year was hosting the OCNZ AGM and judging seminar. From all aspects this was an extremely successful event in its organization, smooth running and financial returns. Anton was the main driving force behind this with countless hours behind the scenes setting this up. Help came from others and we must not forget the intense 3 days and more of food preparation and service carried out by the kitchen crew who were faultless in their timing and

organization, having to feed over 70 people. We are very thankful for the hard work and dedication of all the members who helped make this event the success it was.

Another milestone for our club was having Anton elected onto the committee of the OCNZ. It is great that we now have a voice on national affairs that affect all the affiliated societies.

Anton, Len and Phil have also been busy on the steering committee for the 2016 national show in Auckland.

I will not go into too much detail about all the various activities we have sponsored over the year but I'm sure most of you were able to take part in some if not all. Last Christmas we asked members to supply the food, a departure from previous years and I must say I was very impressed with the way you responded with such a fantastic selection.

Our BBQ was held only last week, again at Eureka Nurseries and was a very enjoyable social occasion with plenty of prizes taken home by those present.

Our show was successful despite higher than normal expenses which were needed to make the set up easier. But getting more public through the door is a very puzzling problem. There seems to be an upper limit on this number irrespective of how much advertising we do. Last year 24 signs were erected in the immediate area covering all the main roads into and out of Howick and Pakuranga for the week prior to the show. We know from past surveys these are by far the most cost effective and visible advertising method although it is very labour intensive.

It should be realized by those that use the club to their advantage by selling their orchids at the show and club days there is a limit to how much effort some of us are going to be able to contribute in setting the show up in the future. It is the work behind the scenes that takes the time and effort. Both financially and for recruitment of new members the show does not contribute that much to the society for the amount of work involved, even though we have been refining this to make it easier and will continue to do so.

Our auction was also slightly down on previous years but despite this it is a very quick and effective method of getting established plants to new members at very reasonable prices while the club earns a good income. For the amount of effort involved this is one of the most beneficial events for members and the club. I feel many of you need to understand that there were some extremely cheap good quality plants sold at this and previous auctions, and you should realize these same plants would cost a lot more elsewhere.

At other society shows the team led by Kathy has continued to be successful with our displays and always soliciting favourable comments from the public.

To end on a more pressing point I am now at the point of asking the question 'who wants to take over the Presidency and some of the other executive positions'? I have held this position for too long and do not want to become stale or have members questioning why I am holding on to this position. I and others would like to see more of you stepping up to take more responsibility. I feel we have gone that extra mile to bring the club back to one of the most successful in the country and it may be the time to ask yourself 'isn't it time I contributed in some other way to keep things running smoothly'?

I have been President far longer than most, as have Anton and Janet in their roles as well as many of the committee. We are fortunate to have a very efficient and amiable committee and I wish to compliment them on their excellent support throughout the year. I would like to thank Raewyn and Lee who are stepping down for their input and help.

So to summarise I am at the point where I would like to pursue some other leisure activities as I'm sure would others on the committee. Even though we are running smoothly please think seriously about the directions you want the society to go and who will take up the challenges ahead. We need dedicated people who will see the society through the next period and not flounder like so many have in recent times.
