CULTURE: After last month's depressing weather I thought we might have had something to look forward to, but no such luck. Many have had their plants damaged with the high winds and I imagine that's not all. The main cultural requirement at this time is to look after flowering plants so they may be exhibited at the shows. If you have had plants outside then they really should have been sheltered from the excessive rainfall we have experienced. Roots will rot if they are kept wet for prolonged periods in cool weather.

EDITOR'S COMMENT

One of the great things about orchid growing is the diversity of flowers, different species and hybrids from many genera. Every time I go to a show or visit another society I find something I've never encountered before, plus a few eccentric growers to add to the variety. Buying one of these odd plants is always a challenge, as you really don't know what to expect, how to grow it or what conditions it prefers. This is where we can take advantage of the club library, internet or our own books to do some research and learn more about what we are growing.

Sometimes I'm surprised to find that the newly acquired plant is on the endangered CITES list, is rare in its native habitat or has some other unique feature making it a desirable plant to be coveted. Growing one of these well and flowering it makes me even more satisfied. There are many growers around the country who have quite large mixed collections and sometimes they decide to cut back or get rid of particular genera in order to specialize in others. Maybe it is a plant that has just sat doing nothing for years and the grower has decided to make room for something new or it is something they are not interested in pursuing. We may be able to give these plants conditions more to their liking and succeed where others have failed. Collecting unusual or rare species and hybrids can be an advantage to those wishing to breed new hybrids. Older hybrids are sometimes useful for increasing the diversity in new crosses and hopefully will add to the range of new flowers available to growers. Many older hybrids are more vigorous than something that has been bred over and over again. I personally have been seeking out these and other odd species with breeding in mind. I first check the family tree of my plants on Wildcatt (orchid programme) and determine whether I would consider it worthwhile for what I have in mind or hope to achieve. For instance I recently found a very nice old Cattleya Portia var. coerulea at the Whangarei show for sale. Some would consider it not up to the standard of modern hybrids but in actual fact it has good shape, colour, form and is a compact plant. Being vigorous, free flowering, long lasting and almost a primary hybrid makes this just what I want. Obviously everyone has their own theories and unless we put them to the test then we won't get the diversity or go in new directions. Being such a large family of plants there are many different genera people can specialize in putting their own knowledge to good use.

NEW MEMBERS

Hopefully you will have put your plants somewhere secure and out of the weather over the winter. With spring around the corner (hopefully) new growths will soon be showing and this is the time to start repotting, fertilizing and encouraging your plants to put on some rapid growth. We would encourage you to bring any orchids in flower to our show. Exhibiting your plants and helping during the judging on Sat. morning is where you can learn a lot. All club members get free entry to our show and don't forget we have a good sales table with commercial growers from Tauranga, Whakatane and locally selling orchids.

WAITAKERE ORCHID CLUB - SILVER ANNIVERSARY SHOW

This is a club that pulls out all the stops to ensure a well-attended, very successful event every year and this; their Silver anniversary was certainly one to be remembered.

With lovely displays and some exceptional orchids it is a show not to be missed. Sales were boosted by many commercial growers stalls including Easy Orchids (Australia) selling flasks on the Saturday. Murray's talk on Madagascar at the dinner on the Sat. night was spell binding with amazing photos of the wild flora and fauna much of which is unknown to botanists and found nowhere else in the world.

HOS mounted a display going for a simple colour scheme of yellows and whites, which had the desired effect. With many *Den. speciosums* in flower we built the display around these with Len's massive specimen taking centre stage and attracting a lot of comment.
