EDITOR'S COMMENT

It is always a worry when you make statements regarding orchid plant names or orchid identification publicly. There is the risk that you may be completely wrong. At best we can make some educated attempts but the final say must go to the experts.

It was pointed out rightly to me that we can't base our attempts at naming on colour alone. My guess that the Dendrochilum I thought was not glumaceum was in fact based on more than just colour and I really should have made that clearer in the last newsletter. The ones we generally see here are white but there are other colour forms. A good clear close up picture was what was needed in this case so that it could be analyzed further.

There are many orchids that have not been identified and so not named. Some that have been named are now considered to be varietals of an already named species and vice versa. Also we see numerous name changes as science gets more exact.

So where does this leave us amateurs? Puzzled to say the least. Some of the orchids we see have been around a long time and could have been brought into the country by travelers or growers long before the restrictions we now face. I wonder whether the Dendrochilum I viewed falls into this category, like Lea's Laelia a rarity among growers today.

And then there is the problem of finding the expert. Even many of these will disagree. As Dennis pointed out recently ask 5 Botanists to classify an orchid and you will get 10 different answers. In NZ people specializing in orchids are becoming thin on the ground and I have been forced to send photos overseas to prove or disprove a point.

Which brings me to the observation that 42.7 percent of all statistics are made up on the spot

RESEARCH

Do I dare mention it? The dreaded Dendrochilum rears its head yet again!

At the WOC show every year is Species specialist seller Geraldine Wood who brings her unusual orchids all the way from the Manawatu to sell to us here in Auckland.

I was quick off the mark to secure 3 rare(?) species of Dendrochilum orchids. As usual there is always one plant that causes problems with identification. This was Ddc. ventricosum from the highlands of Sumatra. This is about all I could find out about it with the means at my disposal and one of the reasons we are trying to source more specialist orchid books. The internet does have its limitations. Ddc's come from mainly the Philippines, Borneo, Indonesia and a few other areas and can grow from the lowlands (hot and steamy) all the way up into the high mountain areas where it gets very cool. I have been up to Baguio City in the Philippines (about 1750m above sea level) where it is normal to see everyone wearing warm clothing and thick jackets. It can snow at the equator in the higher areas of New Guinea (and in the Andes).

Nice specimen plants of Ddc. arachnites and tenellum were benched at the WOC and although the flowers are small, long inflorescences and lots of them make a lovely display.

CULTURE

With so much rain recently I hope you haven't left your plants out in the open to effectively drown. That is the reason I use a very open mix on my plants as they can dry off quickly. I have quite a few hanging under trees so don't want to be constantly shifting things. The seminar I (and others) attended at NZOS recently was very helpful in the culture of New Guinea Dendrobiums and I've already made some changes to where some of these plants are located. There are just so many different areas orchids grow we need to be always researching culture, especially if some plants are not performing well. With spring just around the corner (hopefully) it is time to start thinking about repotting. Generally as new growth starts to show is a good time to decide what plants need a bigger pot to grow into. You can repot any time of the year but spring is always a favourite as the plants can grow into their new pots quickly without setbacks.
