## **CULTURE**

We are still getting the warmth so all you need to do is supply the 'wet'. Growth this summer has been prolific with a better than average number of new shoots and their development into larger than normal bulbs. I'm even having good success with back-bulbs from some of the more difficult genera showing new shoots.

Keeping up the water has been a real chore over the summer. The high humidity has been beneficial but watch out for those unexpected cool nights when fungus diseases can start very rapidly. A general spray with fungicide in March is sensible.

Many experts recommend now (end Feb) is the time to give your orchids a dose of dried blood (especially Cyms) to encourage autumn growth. Put the dried blood in a stocking and soak in a bucket of water then use the water on the plants. Direct application of the powder can encourage pollen mite.

If we don't get any cool nights soon then a spray of your Cyms in the evening may be enough to cool them down to encourage flower spikes to set.

Make sure you are keeping ants under control as they love to make nests in orchid pots.

TOOTHACHE: The pain that drives you to extraction. (The bill will drive you to bankruptcy).

#### **NEW MEMBERS**

Last month I wrote about 3 of the easier orchids to start with. If you are keen or want to try some of the others then there are plenty to choose from. Early on I didn't have any success with Sarchochilus but once you find the correct place to grow them they are very easy and very rewarding. They come from Australia and generally grow very well in Auckland. Some prefer pots and others do better on a slab. The way to work this out is if you have a few which are all doing well in pots except one, then take it out and try on a slab or a flat ceramic dish which I find some prefer. They need more shade than many other orchids and generally a cool spot in your growing area with plenty of air movement. As they do not have a pseudo-bulb they will need more frequent watering than others. As with most of my orchids I grow them in a relatively coarse free draining mix, which does dry out quickly.

Now if you can grow these then the next step is to grow Masdevallias. These thrive in very similar conditions to the Sarcs and I grow them next to each other.

I use a similar mix although some species do require damper conditions. Only experience or research will solve the problem of which these are.

Like all orchids there are warm to cool growers in the same genus so do find out before you buy. Utilise the books in our library to research the plants in your collection. The internet is another way of researching the parentage of hybrids. RHS has up to date information on all orchid hybrids.
