EDITOR'S COMMENT

Please make use of our extensive library of orchid books and remember to return them the following month. There are other society newsletters also available.

This year we want to try a few new ideas with the display table now that we are getting such a good number of plants each month. We will endeavour to place similar genera together to make the plant commentary easier and the commentators will be asked to select a 'plant of the month' for special mention. This will generally be something a little unusual or special.

If you are unsure where to place your plant please ask someone for assistance. New signs will be made and placed on the tables. The popular vote will still remain as previous (Open, Novice and Novelty) and don't forget each plant benched receives 1 point.

NEW MEMBERS CULTURE

With warm temperatures you shouldn't be experiencing too many problems. But don't be complacent, do some research on the plants you have and make sure that the ones needing shelter when the cooler weather comes are separated so they can be protected quickly.

All flowers, which have been on the plants for some time, should be cut giving your plants time to produce new growth. Many new growers cannot bear to cut a stem especially if it is the first time the plant has flowered but this time of the year is when the plant needs to re energise and flowering will just sap energy out of it. Many orchid flowers will last very well in a vase. All the new bulbs growing should be getting larger than the previous bulbs and fattening up. If this is not the case then it could be you are not watering and/or fertilising enough. It is normal for some of the older leaves to yellow and finally dry up then fall off your orchids. Usually the lower ones on Phals do this at this time of the year and all the leaves off one or more old bulbs on others. If new or recent growths are getting too yellow it could be a sign of too much light. Dark green leaves indicate too little light and your plants may not flower.

CULTURE: Now we are in the grips of summer your orchids should be getting plenty of care. Do feed and water frequently. Don't 'cook' them. Watch out for direct sun on water droplets on thick leaves. Keep insects under control now. In hot weather a small infestation can go through a collection very rapidly. Ensure there is plenty of air movement in any confined area, glass houses can heat up very quickly, mist frequently to reduce temperatures.

RESEARCH

Dennis brought some interesting plants last meeting. Thunias (Thu) usually flower in the summer so his was a little early. The flowers don't last long so not a lot of people grow them. Unless dried off once the foliage dies down they will rot over the winter.

His Dendrobium with the little white flowers again has a very short flowering period, the flowers only lasting a day. With lots of flowers though they make up for the brief flowering.

Sobralias are sequential flowering, which means they keep on coming so can flower for quite a while if grown well. There are not many around orchid growers in NZ so keep your eye out if you see any for sale. They can grow into a large clump making quite a specimen.

The Masdevallia was labelled 'remake'. This means that the cross was previously made and registered but his plant has the same two parents (in name) re-crossed. The hybrid must be named with the previously registered name. Quite often growers will do the remake with better quality parents hoping for an improvement on the original, which may have been done many years previously.
