The following is a short synopsis of an article written by Fred Clarke which appeared in the Australian Orchid Review June/July 2012.

Fred Clark is well known as the owner of Sunset Valley Orchids in California and also as a hybridiser. He has been in New Zealand several times, giving talks and selling flasks.

Cattleya Plant Culture

Watering and fertilising:

Let the roots dry out between watering. During the summer months water twice a week with a weak fertilizing solution (half the recommended strength)

During the winter months once a week is sufficient. Do not water if frost is expected.

Light level, Temperature and air movement:

Use 50% shade in winter and 70% shade in summer. Try to keep temperatures to between 24-30 deg during the day and 15-24 at night for the summer, during the winter 18-26 and 12-15 deg at night. Good airflow is needed in the growing area.

Potting Mix:

Kiwi Orchid Pine bark is good and lasts for 3-5 years. Mix 3 parts of bark with 1 part of perlite. Do not over-pot, allow for 2-3 year growth.

Re-potting:

Generally in spring or summer, wait until you see new active root tips before re-potting. Keep the size of the divisions between 3 and 5 pseudobulbs. Remove most of the old media from the root system. If the roots are too intertwined with the old media, it is better to leave the old media in place so as not to damage the new root system.
