CULTURE: It's been a late summer in Auckland with very warm days and also warm nights.

Consequently growth has been good and new shoots are still appearing on many plants.

<u>Cymbidiums</u>: Higher P and K fertiliser now through autumn. Keep cool at night with a sprinkle of water. Watch for any early inflorescences showing and be careful not to damage them.

Cyms are gross feeders so you can give higher concentrations of fertiliser.

<u>Cattleyas</u>: High light and dry out between waterings. Same fertilser as above (low strength) as many will produce flowers in autumn on new growths. Some Laelias will be coming into flower shortly.

<u>Dendrobiums</u>: High light, continue watering and fertilising. Dens prefer a low Nitrogen fertiliser. New canes will continue to appear even now if given the correct culture. Nobiles very high light from now on through winter and frequent fertiliser until about May.

<u>Odontoglossums</u>: Keep up the water to ensure fat bulbs and new growths. They prefer more shade than the orchids mentioned above and must not dry completely.

<u>Masdevallias</u>: As for Odonts and must be kept as cool as possible otherwise they will drop their leaves if heat stressed.

<u>Phalaenopsis</u>: Beware of spotting or crown rot in autumn! A sudden cool night will wreak havoc at this time of year especially if they are wet at night from watering. The leaves should be firm and not limp. Zygos: As for Cymbidiums. To avoid leaf spot do not overhead water.

<u>Oncidiums</u> and <u>Brassias</u>: Can be watered frequently but must be very well drained. Can cope with higher light levels than Odonts.

Miltonias: As for Odonts. Should be flowering now or very soon.

<u>Miltoniopsis</u>: Very finicky, require year round even temperatures, not too hot and not too cold. Also need constant humidity. These are not easy to grow well.

<u>Paphiopedilums</u>: I only have a couple and keep these with the Odonts. Many like extra calcium as they grow on limestone. They prefer to be constantly moist but if you rot the roots it is almost impossible to get them to grow new ones.

There was some discussion last meeting inspired by Wolf re the last newsletter's Culture Notes. When I suggested we should not be using high Nitrogen fertilisers and then saying to apply the dried blood now (which is high N) it appeared to be contradictory. My understanding from the expert who advocates this, is that the dried blood has some hormone in it, which activates new autumn growth especially in Cymbidiums.

Like all these ideas everyone has a different theory and the latest AOS magazine's article on Phalaenopsis suggests (with University research to back the claim) that Potassium (K) not Phosphorous (P) is the most important chemical needed to get optimum flowering. This also contradicts my previous culture notes where I suggest you get some Mag-Pro or similar that is very high in P! No doubt the chemical companies who make all these products will be rushing out to sponsor more research to reassess their time proven products before sales plummet. Please note Dyna Grow products are available from Len, they aren't sold in shops.

Not a big display, another indication of a late flowering season, but saved by a few and especially Ron Reeves' superb collection of unusual species orchids (but what were those rogues doing in there?). Commentary was by Leigh Leaity who was really on roll giving an in-depth coverage of all the plants on display. Leigh was helped by Wolf.

RESEARCH

Grahame's *Dendrobium toressae* displayed last meeting interested me. Firstly I could not find any record of it on the RHS site but there was a reference on an Australian Government site that it had been renamed in 2002 to Stilbophyllum. Grahame assured me it was listed in his big Dendrobium book and it was also listed for sale at an Australian nursery as a Dendrobium. In Jay's Orchid Species site it is given as all of the above including a vague reference to a misspelling of 'Stelbophyllum' plus the synonym *Bulbophyllum toressae*. This is often the way with unusual plants particularly if they are not commonly grown or available.

It's difficult enough trying to get the name right without all the synonyms and name changes.

The common name of this orchid is the Torres Strait Orchid as it comes from the islands between Australia and New Guinea. It grows in exposed locations as an epiphyte or lithophyte (on trees or rocks) at altitudes from 910m to 1200m and will grow hot to cool.

Ron's beautiful Den. topaziacum from the Philippines, is correctly known as Den. bullenianum.

Another problem plant was Michelle's *Restrepia striata*. The correct name for this plant (after a lot of puzzling reading) is *Restrepia brachypus*.

What has often happened with a lot of orchids is that back in the 1800's when there were various botanists rushing around discovering new species they often named very similar ones differently. These were later found on closer inspection, to be the same species although maybe slightly different in appearance or colour, possibly due to regional or climatic influences.

Restrepias are a genus of approx. 50 species from South American and are related to the Pleurothallids (Masdevallias etc). These orchids come from Mexico through to Northern Argentina and are found at elevations of 1800m to 2400m in open areas near rivers or streams, so are definitely a cool grower. This particular one comes from wet rain forests so would prefer more shade. They can grow into large specimen plants and are easy to propagate from kiekies.

Many of the Restrepias are very showy and hardier in cultivation than some of the Masdevallias. **As** for some of the other label updates required some are even more puzzling. For instance it is highly unlikely that 2 species crossed (in the more commonly grown genera) will not have been named. John's Cattleya had in it *C. harrisoniae* x *C. bicolor*. Now I certainly don't expect a novice grower or newer member to realise this so I looked it up. The big problem here is that there is listed a *C. harrisoniaa* as well as harrisoniae in RHS.

Harrisoniana appears to be the more commonly accepted species name. An amateur Brazilian website (Awarded the gold medal for amateur sites at Dijon World Orchid Conf.) lists harrisoniae as a synonym for harrisoniana.. Jay's Orchid Species website lists harrisoniae as either a subspecies of loddigesii or a synonym for hardyana, which I now believe to be outdated. As Greg Alikas on his Orchidworks site comments '*C. harrisoniana* has endured a case of mistaken identity for almost a century, for much of that time it was known as *C. loddigesii* var. *harrisoniae*'.

John's cross according to RHS has not been done, unless you put in hardyana (natural hybrid) or loddigesii then it has been! In fact there are 2 completely different names for bicolor with loddigesii. One name for the natural hybrid and another for the cultivated hybrid. To make matters worse there are 2 different names for the cross with Hardyana. But I think I am fairly safe in saying that it should be *C*. *harrisoniana* (syn. *harrisoniae*) x *C*. *bicolor* = *C*. Duchesnei.

I wish I'd never started this. If the weather had been decent and the fishing better I wouldn't have. NOTE: There will definitely NOT be a question on this next meeting.
