CULTURE: There is definitely a cooler change evident in the evenings and this is when care should be taken with Phallies as they will quickly succumb to crown rot if left wet on cool nights. You should now be checking to see if any flower inflorescences are developing as there are a couple of 1 day shows coming up. These are always good fun as they are more intimate so you can discuss orchids with others at leisure. Some Laelias and Cattleyas will be flowering in the autumn as well as Miltonias. Phalaenopsis will flower anytime but they need a cooling off of 2 weeks to initiate flowers. Most growers have this naturally happen in autumn when there is a cooling off period meaning that you will get flowers around December (9 months). If you cool them in Dec. you should get flowers in 9 months time, which is when the shows are on (Aug-Oct). Aussie Dendrobiums and Sarcs generally flower in spring through summer although Grahame's very early one last meeting was the exception. Cymbidiums should start to show signs of flower inflorescences soon, they are sharper than new vegetative growths but be careful, as they are very brittle.

As soon as you see flowers buds you need to keep your plants out of severe weather and watch for snail attack. It is very disheartening to wait so long only to have everything ruined in one night. You should be a little more prudent with watering now as the garden and pot plants are taking longer to dry out. If you are growing warmer varieties or seedlings outdoors you should consider giving them a little more warmth on cooler nights, so watch the forecast night temperatures so you aren't caught out.

EDITOR'S COMMENT

This February Manee and I traveled with an orchid group to Japan to see the Tokyo Dome Grand Prix Orchid Show. In a word it was FANTASTIC. We were just overcome with the range, quality and abundance of flowers on display. The trip included 6 nights in Tokyo and 3 in Kyoto so we had some sight seeing and other activities to partake in as well. With 2 cameras in action full time we have many photos to sort through and picking the ones for a talk will be difficult. I will be presenting this at the June meeting so you will be able to see a few of my favourites as well as some other interesting scenes. It is winter in Japan in February but not a damp cold, so was bearable. We were pleasantly surprised at prices as the popular misconception is it is an expensive country to visit. A good rate on the NZ dollar helps.

Joy Wray (Taranaki) had organized everything for the 13 travelers but allowed us enough free time to 'do our own thing' as well. Included were a full day trip to Mt Fuji, a half day tour of Tokyo and a full day tour of the historic sites in Kyoto.

The flowers displayed at the show were all of the highest quality and such well grown plants they made stunning viewing. The Dome is huge (it's a baseball stadium) and was filled with benched plants, displays, flower arrangements, sales of orchids and many other stalls with sponsors' products. I was particularly impressed with the Cattleyas, Lycastes and Phalaenopsis. The Chinese Cymbidiums were also something new for us especially as there were so many different varieties and colours. The sales stalls were mainly selling potted plants, cut flowers and sponsors' products and it took a long time to get around them all. 1 day is not enough at a show of this magnitude as there is so much to see and do. Surprisingly there were few Europeans evident but with the WOC just a week or so earlier in Miami maybe it was just too much to choose from. Taiwan also has a big show the first week in March so if you had the money and were in the orchid mood there was certainly a lot to see in a short time period. Language can be a problem but everywhere there was someone to help out.

The train service is unsurpassed making travel a dream (well almost, if you could follow the signs). If you are worried about 'Big Brother' watching over you don't go as we were all finger printed and photographed at immigration. If you like a country that is spotlessly clean, gives excellent service, friendly and you eat Japanese food then do go.

RESEARCH

First Prize at the Tokyo Show was Eulophiella roempleriana, a species from Madagascar found in the tops of pandanus palms. Pandanus grows in wet areas and is a tropical tree although culture notes say this orchid grows from warm to cool conditions. It is one of only 5 species from this genus and was separated from the larger genus Eulophia. The flower is waxy, long lasting and very attractive, a little similar to a Cattleya. The variety on display was named and could be a line bred one although this is unknown. It had a lot flowers but were hard to see clearly as they were so high. The plant was mounted on a small table and the leaves stood straight up with the flowers on stems another meter so above these so truly a monster of a plant.
