EDITOR'S COMMENT

HOS is currently looking into putting on a display at the **Orchid Extravaganza** in Palmerston North in September. We have deliberately left planning until late as finding people willing to go down was difficult early on. This will be quite an effort, as the plants have to be transported such a long distance in fairly cramped conditions plus props taken to mount the display. Its been done before and I'm sure we can handle this without too much stress again.

Anyone going to visit the show from our society please let me know if you are able to help out in any way. Set up is Tues 7th Sept. judging 8th, open to public 9th to Sun 12th Sept.

I have been busy pollinationing this summer using pollen collected earlier in the year to cross with late flowering plants. This should alter the flowering time on the resulting cross but it will be a long time before this is confirmed. Orchid breeding is slow and sometimes frustrating as many of the pollinations will not take. Out of those that do some will abort and there are other things that can go wrong. Out of about a dozen Dens I only got 1 pod, which burst open before it could be harvested. I did a similar number of Sarcs and again only ended up with 1 pod. So far 3 of my Cattleya crosses have aborted and 1 has gone rotten. The only Masdevallia pod had no seed! Determining the ripening time is also a little tricky. Some only take a couple of months whereas others take up to 9 months. From there they are taken to someone with a sterile lab setup to be sown into jars of agar. These are then placed in a light cabinet with temperature control and hopefully germination will occur sometime in the next year (or so). Contamination of the flask can ruin over a year's effort very quickly. All going well the grower then has a big job looking after the seedlings from the flask and there are no guarantees the results will be desirable. Flowering can be anything from 18 months to 3 years out of flask.

RESEARCH

One interesting thing about orchids is that we frequently see an unusual plant that even the experts have not seen or heard of before. These more often or not are species someone has in a collection and could be difficult to flower or only flower for a short time.

Although not that unusual Draculas are not easy to display as they do not transport well. It is not unusual for the flower to collapse after a short time away from home. They belong to the Pleurothallid group, which also contains Masdevallias.

CULTURE:

This is another critical time of the year for unwary orchid growers and I still get caught out even though I should have learnt from past experience.

The sudden onset of cool nights is always a trap for those who have watered late in the day when the plants do not have time to dry off. I always put my Phallies out on the porch over summer and they are particularly susceptible to crown rot. This is caused by water sitting in the top of the leaves when the night is cool. Other orchids will also get rot on new soft growths in similar circumstances.

Now that we are going into autumn you should be changing from high nitrogen (N) fertilizer to high potassium (K) to promote flowering. Watering will need to be cut down as the days shorten and the temperatures drop. Depending on how many cool nights we have experienced, Cymidiums should be starting to spike from now on.
