CULTURE: At last some warmer weather and noticeable growth on the orchids. My Cyms have started new growths early this year and many other orchids seem to be reacting positively to a little warmth after a long winter. This is the time to repot, divide if necessary and start with a weak fertilizer. I've mentioned before to look at your plants and see what they are doing, they will tell you when it is time to water and fertilise. They can dry out quickly after a few warm breezy days once growth starts in earnest. Those in flower can lose condition rapidly at this time of the year. Plastic/glass houses can heat up very quickly so keep an eye on temperatures in these now. Don't forget the sun is rapidly getting higher so leaf burn is a danger on plants receiving more light. Be careful leaving water on the leaves of Phallies (and other fleshy leaf varieties), which may be exposed to the sun. I make this mistake every year ending up with unsightly blotches and burn marks. A worst-case scenario is you can burn these so badly it will kill the plant. A recent article (AOS magazine?) I read gives the relative light levels various genera can cope with. Cymbidiums and Dendrobiums will take the most.

I learnt more about orchids and orchid culture in those 2 days possibly than in many years of my association with the hobby. A large number of flasks were available many of genera not usually found in NZ, plus the latest in mini Cattleya breeding. We are fortunate that NZOS has been proactive in organizing these visits and with the success of them we look forward to even more in the future. Eight HOS members (home soc) were in attendance. Others came from all over NZ including the south island.

NEW MEMBERS

Although it's nice to go to the beach and take advantage of the good weather hopefully coming, you should take some time to get your orchids in order now.

Some effort in the spring will save a lot of time later and give your plants a good start for the growing season. Broken down media (especially bark) is a big cause of root rot.

Orchids with a lot of back bulbs (leafless bulbs usually in the middle or to one side of the plant) need to be divided and cleaned up. The dead roots on these will sour the mix and usually the plant will be rotten in the middle harbouring disease and insects.

If you have bought flasks then deflasking can be done soon and the seedlings potted up. This gives them a chance to get established over the warmer months. Everyone has his/her own preferences but I prefer to pot into a mix of fine bark/pumice/pearlite. I crock the small pots well with polystyrene and put 2 to 4 seedlings per small pot depending on size.

Use pots with good drainage holes, this also allows some air movement. Many new to orchid growing use pots that are unsuitable for orchids. I spend a lot of time drilling extra holes in the bottom and sides of pots.

You certainly learn a lot about growing (or killing) orchids by growing seedlings.
